Devil's Lake is home to many owls - great-horned, barred, and screech to name a few. Come and discover more about these fascinating raptors and make an owl to take

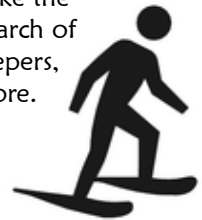

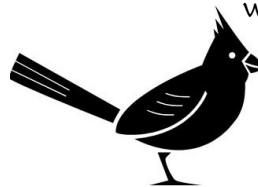
